Changed? Me? Of course not! I'm still the same as I've always been. Maybe a bit grayer and perhaps a wee bit wiser. But I am basically the same paragon of something or other I've always been. I'm doing things as I always have.

Do you buy that? Don't.

We all keep changing and growing in different directions. (I am referring to the expansion of our minds, not our matters.)

In my earlier years of dealing with computers there was no such thing as a friendly user interface. I faced a blinking cursor on a black screen filled with little green or yellow characters if I needed to interact with the machine. After the graphical user interface was introduced with its point and click logic, producing a useful report became a lot easier and much quicker.

That was a quarter of a century ago. The "What You See Is What You Get" revolution expanded access to personal computing beyond the geeky techie crowd.

The first Mac I used in an office was running a word processor, spread sheets, and Quark. The office had several of those one-piece Mac classic models linked together in a simple network sending material to one shared laser printer and one standalone hard drive. The printer and the hard drive were bulky machines. Today's printers are much smaller and more talented and even a tiny 128MB flash drive has more storage capacity than that old drive had.

I purchased my first Mac about fifteen years ago with a hard drive smaller than a 256MB thumb drive! With ClarisWorks I had a word processor, spread sheets, and a layout program. I soon added and

NorthWest Apple Pickers Board Meeting Report, April 7th, 2009

The NWAP Board meeting was called to order at the home of Erick Camp by President Erick at 7:20pm on Tuesday, April 7th, 2009, after a dinner welcoming new Board members and honoring those who are leaving the Board.

The minutes of the March Board meeting were approved as printed in the Newsletter

A contract was received for the payment to Stewart Beels who has financed the purchase of the new OPTIMA EP 1691 projector now being used for NWAP meetings. The cost was \$767.52. Payments will be no less than \$50.00 monthly. The Board may authorize accelerated payments at any time. The initial payment on April 7, 2009 was \$167.52, leaving a balance of \$600.00.

Treasurer's report was given by Treasurer Marilynn Russell. We have \$968.92 funds available at this time.

Red Chip: \$84.00 as of March and is to be recalculated.

There was discussion about the Red Chip fund, and how the moneys are divided and disbursed. The amount of monies collected from the sale of tickets for the drawing are equally divided between the Red Chip fund and the Club General Fund. Payments are made to the person who draws for the Red Chip. If they draw and get a White Chip, they are given \$3.00 from the Red Chip Fund. If they draw a Red Chip, they get all the moneys in the Red Chip fund. The Treasurer then issues a check for this amount to be given to the winner for drawing the Red Chip.

Further discussion occurred regarding the Petty Cash fund. It was MSP that this fund be discontinued and the money will be placed in the NWAP Savings account.

Membership Reported 20 members and one visitor attended the New Users Meeting March 5, and 18 members attended the General Meeting March 8, with one new member and two visitors. Both March meetings had a total of 21 attendees at each meeting. There were five membership renewals.

Total membership in NWAP as of March 31, 2009 is 72.

Apple Ambassador Peter Winderling received material from Apple User Group requesting information regarding our club. He has filled out the requested report. This was accepted by the Board.

Publicity Chairman Marilynn Russell gave a full report on her many activities, including distribution of Club posters. She also reported on her successful SIG group meeting on the first Thursday afternoon of each month at the Lakewood Fire Station on Washington Street. Attendance averages about 5 - 9 persons. Marilynn and Webb Olliphant will be working with the Tacoma Public Schools, the Comcast computer program hosted by Dorothy Wilhelm at the Puyallup Korum YMCA, and other individuals needing help with their Macs. Report accepted.

The Users Group (APCUG) has articles available for us to use in our Newsletters if we are a member of this group. It was MSP that we join this group for a year and then have the Newsletter Editor evaluate these articles. If the Editor feels these articles can be used in our Newsletter, we will continue our membership.

All instructions on articles, name spelling, or any other matter are to be carefully written out and forwarded to our Editor David.

Meeting adjourned at 8:35pm.

experimented with other programs. I learned to save early and often if I wanted to preserve my work. New User Group meetings were often workshops on how to maintain and troubleshoot our computers. Software and hardware advances continued to deliver more content and capabilities than you could shake a stick at.

As the number of computer users expanded, the world of communications grew and changed. Folks who never expected to touch a computer discovered a need to email distant friends or research the Internet from their den. And organize their photos. Or edit their videos. And have a video chat with family on the other side of the world.

A decade has passed since the first iMac made its Bondi Blue debut. The system and applications that ran on that model were lightyears ahead of those from a decade earlier. They were, however, just natural extensions and enhancements of the basic applications around from the beginning. Words, numbers, layouts, and graphics were the foundation for all talented applications that evolved over the years. As the hardware advanced so did the software. And so did the range of tasks that humble home computer (or laptop) could do.

The other day I took a bunch of pictures with my digital camera and loaded them into my Mac. I tweaked some of them in a photo editing program. I modified their size so I could send them to friends as attachments to email. When my first Mac arrived I could not have done any of those tasks. Email was still a hoped-for dream. (We were still trying to figure out local Bulletin Boards!) The Internet had not evolved to the world wide public utility we know today. Digital photography was crude and reserved for the very patient and very well-heeled.

Some of our members arrive at NWAP with slim hopes of ever understanding their computers. As they begin to take charge they also begin to change their minds. Expand their horizons. Change. Grow. Try new things.

Changed? Changing? You bet. I'm one heckuva different person than I was a decade ago. I'm a Mac User! I have no choice! I must learn how, I must discover why. Why not?

New User Review- Apple 's Mail

(as presented at the April 2nd Meeting)

Email is one of the most common computer activities for most of us, so Mail, the OS X application that handles email is easy to take for granted. We explored the Preferences and ways to customize your Mail rules. We looked at ways to use Mail to collect email from several different accounts and we also demonstrated how to set up Mail Boxes (folders) and Smart Mail Boxes to store and organize your emails, as well as searching and displaying your files.

We reviewed the ways to use "TO", "CC", and "BCC" in addressing email. We discussed the etiquette and ethics of forwarding emails so that we can protect the privacy of our addressees.

The Mail application in Leopard 10.5 offers built in templates for special stationery and it is integrated with iPhoto so you can easily attach images to messages. We discussed how iPhoto and Mail work together to allow you to resize a photo to a reasonable size so your correspondent does not become despondent over the huge download you are sending. Mail also works with iCal and the Address Book, recognizing dates and names so that you can open these applications from within an email to record information.

Mail also offers To Do and Note features which let you create memos to yourself. Among other functions we discussed were the use of Mail as your RSS "reader" and various print and save options.

Mail and the associated applications are the first part of our two-sessions on communications. May's New User Group will explore the Internet using Safari and all of its many features.

Last month I mentioned a Mac Mini crash and rehabilitation following lengthy repair attempts. That same week I bought a new PC with a quad core Intel processor. It came with something I didn't want, the dreaded Vista OS. First off I seemed to like it. That didn't last long. Problem one: A Windows program from work is something that makes a PC handy to have for me. Surprise! The program won't work under Vista in Vista's regular mode or any of the Vista "compatibility" modes where Vista makes believe it is Windows 2000, etc. I just kept getting a pop-up, "This program requires Windows XP." On to my Intel Mac with CrossOver. Another (nice) surprise, the program ran on the Mac. Great program, CrossOver from CodeWeavers.

Problem two: As soon as I got on-line I was bombarded with 50 or more Trojans and viruses. With names like r55t674jj7j.exe. The kind that just won't do anything to a Mac. They need Windows to run because of the EXE extension. My error because I went on-line before installing an

anti-virus program. These Trojans & viruses were very well hidden and invisible to any normal search. All repair attempts failed. I considered wiping the drive and installing XP. But, that would probably void my warranty. Eventually I got everything fixed and strong anti-virus software installed. What a waste of time.

Got a Bluetooth earpiece for my iPhone. The Plantronics Explorer 230 for \$40. One of my sons bought an earpiece at AT&T that he said was an iPhone specific item but he paid \$60 more than I paid. It was because he was so pleased with his wireless earpiece that I decided to get one. So far so good with the Plantronics. Easy to set up. View Your RSS Feeds in Mail

To make it easier to get your info fix, you can send your RSS feeds from the Safari web browser directly to Mail. Then, whenever you check your mail, you can see whether you have news articles waiting to be read. To send an RSS feed to Mail, make a bookmark of the RSS feed (press Command-D). In the resulting dialog box, check Mail to add the bookmark to Mail. Click Add, and it's done!

Interested in only iPhoto tips, or Apple Mail tips, or Photoshop tips (or any other application). The new website is designed to allow you to subscribe to every tip posted, or only those tips for the applications that interest YOU.

These RSS feeds can be sent to you via email or any RSS reader, including Safari and Google Reader. There is a button at the top of the Mac Hints &

Tips home page that takes you to a short video explanation of RSS. For those who already use RSS, you already know how great it is. For those of you who haven't tried it yet and are new to RSS, I think you're going to love it!

Those who have read this column on-line should transition very easily to the new website.

For those who have been reading the newsletter in PDF format, my hope is that you will find the RSS feeds to be superior to the PDFs.

I believe this is an excellent resource for every Mac user, and hope you will pass this information onto the members in your user group.
