“Possibly the discussion is using the wrong vocabulary. “Privacy” is an odd name for the good that is being threatened by commercial exploitation and state surveillance. Privacy implies “It’s nobody’s business,” and that is not really what Roe v. Wade is about, or what the E.U. regulations are about, or even what Katz and Carpenter are about. The real issue is the one that Pollak and Martin, in their suit against the District of Columbia in the Muzak case, said it was: liberty. This means the freedom to choose what to do with your body, or who can see your personal information, or who can monitor your movements and record your calls—who gets to surveil your life and on what ground...”

coast ended the need for the Pony Express in 1861. It was another eight years before the transcontinental railroad was completed. Electricity, apparently, is faster than horses or trains.

Technology just kept marching forward. A century ago the internal combustion engine was confounding the status quo. Automobiles and airplanes had changed the way folks moved between places and transformed our economy. Voice had been added to "tele" to become "telephone." Words and music were being broadcast over the air.

And many of our later ancestors were staring at the range of technologies that were changing the world and wondering why anyone would want to use *that*?

More than seven decades have passed since the first electronic computers were beginning to amaze us. From those immense constructions to the personal computers that began showing up 40 years ago, immense changes in nearly every realm of civilization continued to challenge, puzzle, and transform our world—for good and otherwise.

Today the freedom to explore the World Wide Web gives each of us access to more information in a few hours than even the most energetic researcher could have looked at in as frenzied tour of the shelves of the biggest library in a day. We are information junkies. We carry more computing power and store more data in our smartphones than a mainframe computer had in the 1960s.

Throughout the ages, new technology has presented a new set of tools, a new solution, a new set of choices. Those choices are usually the issue that challenge, puzzle, and intimidate us.

That is one of the reasons that computer user groups were created!

Can't you just imagine the group of Neanderthal adults cowering in the back of the cave lit (and warmed) by that new-fangled fire. *Well, how do we use it? How will it make our lives better? What if it shows the saber-tooths where we are?* That was probably the first "user group."

When personal computers came along there was a similar challenge. After the original set of geeks and nerds got through inventing, assembling, and programming those early PCs, the rest of us became hooked. Before there was a World Wide Web, there were local dial-up electronic bulletin boards (wow...there's that telephone/telegraph wire again!) There were spreadsheets and word processing programs to figure out. There were solitaire games to learn.

There was grief management counseling to consider when machines crashed (again and again) before documents were saved.

And so it is that NorthWest Apple Pickers, a computer user group, has been around for three and a half decades. Our toys have gone from kilobytes to terabytes. We transitioned from *really* floppy discs and spinning hard drives to solid state thumb drives and online cloud storage. We've graduated from CRT displays to flatscreen. Our online access is from pocket sized devices and portable units strapped to our wrists or carried under our arm.

And still, we meet each month to try to figure out how the heck to get these devices to do what we want them to do.

It is a challenge and a puzzle. It has changed the way we live and connect to our family, friends, and the world.






Where We Meet This Month
